

Seniors: How to decipher your financial aid award letters.



Many of you have already received acceptance letters. Soon to follow is the financial aid package. These can often be difficult to compare because they don't all look alike. Below are a few resources to help you breakdown your cost of attendance for each college. Sallie Mae has a great <u>video</u> and a few tips which help explain.

- You may have to accept or decline your award with the school, either online or by returning a signed form by the deadline.
- You are not required to accept all the terms in your financial award letter. You can choose to decline loans, work-study, etc.
- Your award letter covers one year only; you'll need to fill out the FAFSA and apply for financial aid every year you're in school.
- Aid is limited, so if you don't accept an award on time, it may go to another student.

The CollegeBoard has also created a <u>tool</u> to help students compare financial aid awards side by side.

A few tips for making the most of your campus visits

- Remember that every school will show you the things they most want you to see; try to determine what matters most to you about a school and attempt to learn more about those things.
- Spend quality time in the student union and the dining hall; eat on campus if possible.
- Don't judge the whole university by whether or not you like your tour guide.
- Write down the name of the admissions counselor and anyone else you meet and send an email or thank you note later.
- Record your impressions of the school while they're still fresh on your mind, and ask yourself what you can be doing now to make sure you are a good candidate for admission.


All Students: Is a Gap Year right for you?



A gap year is typically the period between completing high school and the beginning of college. This time can be either a semester or a full year away from traditional classroom studies. Gap years come in all shapes and sizes including experiential learning, research opportunities, volunteering, outdoor education, travel, or even internships. The rise in popularity of the gap year has created even more opportunities for students worldwide. Some students and parents are concerned about possible negative effects of students taking a gap year. However, research conducted by Middlebury College and UNC, Chapel Hill shows that students who participate in a structured gap program perform better academically than they would have without a gap year. There are many tangible benefits to taking a structured gap year: increased self awareness, broadened cultural perspective, and even experimenting with possible future careers.
